The Dutch town of Gouda (yes indeed, cheese) where I was born. The so-called Tiendeweg (Tithe Road)- seen from the location of the, demolished, Tiendeweg City Gate – in Gouda 1928. Tiend(e) or tenth (tithe) was in Holland, and elsewhere, a mediaeval tax. Landlords levied a tenth, or tithe, on the natural revenues (young cattle, wheat, etc.) of a piece of land. The Tiendweg in Gouda was in the very, very olden days a part of the mud and gravel road between Utrecht and Gouda. One of the oldest roads in Holland.
