Van Heutsz was born February 3rd 1851 in Coevorden, near the German border, in The Netherlands. His father was a professional military officer. At the age of sixteen Van Heutsz joined the army. In 1873, the year of the outbreak of the war between the Dutch and the Sulanate of Aceh, he asked for a transfer to the colonial Dutch East-Indian Army.

The Aceh War war didn't go off smoothly for the Dutch. The Acehnese used their military guerrilla methods successfully. Dutch generals were biting off more than they could chew. Van Heutsz -he climbed the military ranks from bottom to top- changed the Dutch tactics.

- a. He used scientific knowledge about Islam.
- b. He organized a very efficient contra-guerrilla.
- c. He offered the Acehnese a liberal colonial government based on respect to Acehnese adat (common law).


Peace was settled officially in 1903 (!). But, incidentally, fighting continued.

Even nowadays the Acehnese are the cause of serious headaches with Indonesian officials. Their fighting for independence has a legal ground, because the Dutch declared war to the independent Sultanate of Aceh in 1873. Because of that the transfer of Aceh to the Indonesians, by the Dutch in 1949, was an act of doubtful kind.

In 1905 the Dutch Queen Wilhelmina appointed Van Heutsz to be governor-general of The Dutch East-Indies. Van Heutsz carried out ethical politics to realize welfare for the benefit of the native population. His government meant a crucial turning-point.

- a. He advocated to convert raw materials, found in the archipel, in the Dutch East-Indies itself. For example the refining of oil (found in Aceh) near the winning location in Aceh.
- b. He supported the foundation of organizations with the aim to revaluate the culture of Java. For example the support of the Budi Utomo Foundation and the magazine Bintang Hindia.
- c. He stimulated school-education on behalf of natives. For example the organization of so-called desa-schools. d. He stimulated participation of natives in local and provincial governing bodies.

Nevertheless Van Heutsz was a man of law and order. He was not to be trifled with. Revolutionary natives as well as conservative Dutch colonials were afraid of him. He was frank and he larded his comments with a lot of curses. Van Heutsz was a married man and a father of six children. That did not alter the fact that Van Heutz was very interested in beautiful women. He had some passionate affairs.

During his government Van Heutsz established the boundaries of Indonesia from Sabang, North Sumatra as far as Merauke, New Guinea. In this respect Indonesians owe him many thanks.
